President's Report



am very pleased to be delivering my first annual report as President of the Foundation. I have been involved with Deafness Foundation as a Board member for 4 years, and I have worked with deaf

and hard of hearing adults and children for over 30 years. I look forward to using my knowledge and experience as an Audiologist in my role as President.

Deafness Foundation is currently experiencing a time of change and renewal.

Peter Ickeringill stepped down as President at the last AGM and I would like to thank him for the strong leadership he provided to the Foundation over the 17 years he held this position. Peter still has a keen interest in the work of the Foundation. He was appointed as a Governor of the Foundation at the July Board meeting and will continue to be involved with the Peter Howson Deafness Fellowship. Peter was instrumental in establishing this Fellowship along with Board member A/Professor Gary Rance and we welcome his continued support in this role.

Noeleen Bieske and Dr Lyn Walker, two of our long-standing board members both retired from the Board this year. Noeleen was the Chairperson of the Hearing Awareness Week Planning Committee and we thank her for her significant contribution to the success of this event and also for her contribution as a member of the Grants Committee. Lyn was the Chairperson of the Grants Committee until 2014 and retired as an active member of the Board in 2016. Lyn will continue as a member of the Grants committee and we are grateful for her continued expertise with this process.

We welcomed two new members to the Board – Zoe Williams and Noel Henderson. Zoe joined the Board in November and she is an Audiologist experienced in working with deaf and hard of hearing adults and children. Zoe is also deaf herself and is fluent in Auslan. Noel joined the board in February 2016. Noel has worked in technology and telecommunications, and more recently in fundraising. He has also had previous Board experience in the deafness sector. Noel has an acquired hearing loss. We are looking forward to the knowledge and experience that Zoe and Noel will bring to the Board.

In addition, at the time of writing this report we are in the process of appointing a new Executive Officer. Wendy Maher recently indicated that she would be retiring after 10 years in this position. Wendy has worked tirelessly to promote the Foundation, and she has engendered an excellent working relationship with the Board, and also with staff, our volunteers and our stakeholders. I would like to thank Wendy for all her efforts, and also for supporting me during my first year as President.

It was with sadness that we learned of the passing of Stan Batson in March. Stan retired from the Board in 2013 after many years involvement with the Foundation. He was awarded a Deafness Foundation Award in 2014 for promoting an understanding of the needs of deaf people and in particular for promoting Auslan. Stan's funeral was a celebration of a wonderful life, and the Auslan interpreter's versions of the hymns were a testament to the beauty of the language he loved so much.

We have continued to implement the recommendations of the Strategic Review, and this year the focus was on reviewing our committees. A proposal to change from a committee structure to a project structure was approved by the Board and you will see evidence of this new structure reflected in the format of this Annual Report. The committees that have an ongoing role in the operation of the organisation and will remain are the Finance Committee, the Fundraising Committee, the Grants Committee and the Hearing Awareness Week Planning Committee.

Paul O'Halloran, Chair of the previous Noise Induced Hearing Loss Committee will continue his key role in supporting the important research project "Introducing HEARsmart to Music Venues; A Pilot Study. A project officer has been appointed through The HEARing CRC to work with music venues to reduce the incidence of hearing loss in young people due to recreational noise exposure. Education, Conductive Hearing Loss, Medical/ Audiological, Technology and Auslan will continue to remain areas of interest for the Foundation and projects that improve well-being and promote equality for people who are deaf and hard of hearing will continue to be actively sought in these areas. Early discussions on the development of a project on the use of social media to engage young people with the Foundation are already taking place.

Another successful round of Grants was recently completed and I would like to thank my colleagues on the

Grants committee for their diligence in considering all the applications. Having taken on the role of President, I will be stepping down as Chair of the Grant's Committee and a new chair will be appointed in the new financial year.

The Grants program supports community, organisation and research projects, our Education **Encouragement Awards and the Peter** Howson Deafness Fellowship.

The third recipient of the Fellowship is Dr Kerryn Saunders, Developmental Paediatrician with the Monash Children's Hospital. We were pleased to announce Kerryn's appointment at our recent Grants presentation night and she gave a very informative presentation on her project "Early Identification and Management of Congenital Cytomegalovirus (CMV) Hearing Loss / A New Clinical Model".

Our support for this project continues the Foundation's work in reducing the incidence of preventable deafness and hearing loss in children following the successful completion of our Rubella program. CMV is now the most common infection that causes congenital deafness. Anti-viral medication is available; however, not all babies show symptoms at birth and the hearing loss can be progressive. This means that infants may pass their Newborn Hearing Screening Test and so an alternative pathway to detect hearing loss in these babies is needed. Kerryn's research aims to improve the early diagnosis of children with congenital CMV infection, and also to develop a treatment model to improve the long-term outcomes for these children.

Our thanks go to the Royal Victorian Eye and Ear Hospital for continuing to partner with Deafness Foundation in funding the Peter Howson Deafness Fellowship, and to the hard work of Peter Ickeringill and Associate Professor Gary Rance in selecting such a worthy candidate and project.

The rollout of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) is having a significant impact on the way disability services are funded and the Foundation has been keeping a keen eye on what is happening in this space. This government initiative will mean that services are tailored to the needs of the individual and lead to improved outcomes for people with a disability in general, and people who are deaf or hard of hearing in particular. The Foundation recently submitted a position paper to the government regarding services for children under the NDIS. We stressed the need to ensure that the accessibility and quality of paediatric hearing services will not be adversely affected, and that the provisions of hearing aids should remain as cost-effective as it has been under the current funding model through Australian Hearing.

In closing, I would like to thank all Board members for working with me over the past year and giving their time and effort in further developing the strategic objectives - Lyall Clewer, Marie Fram, Noel Henderson, Lisa Jane Moody, Paul O'Halloran, Brian Pyman, Gary Rance, Michaela Riddell, Zoe Williams and Simon Wood. I would also like to thank Wendy Maher and her team - Helen Dunlop, Jenny Portelli and Karen Son. And thanks also to the many individuals who support the Foundation through selling our butterfly badges or donating to the organisation.

Executive Officer's Report



his is my eleventh and final report as Executive Officer of Deafness Foundation as I plan to retire. I have enjoyed my time with the Foundation and had the opportunity to liaise with and work beside many committed and inspiring people. The role has been very varied and interesting and I am very proud of the success that our small team has achieved over the past years. 'No man is an island' and I

certainly could not have achieved what I have without the support of a committed team. To my staff, Jenny Portelli, Karin Son and Helen Dunlop, thank you for your wonderful support, hard work and friendship and to the numerous volunteers who have assisted over the years. A sincere thank you is also extended to previous staff members Monica Haverkamp and Tanya Puglia for their support and contribution to the Foundation.

It has been a year of change at the Foundation. Peter Ickeringill, our long term President retired in July 2015 after seventeen years and has been succeeded by Karin Gillies, a current board member. Two of our long term Board members retired, Noeleen Bieske and Dr Lyn Walker and the Board welcomed new members, Zoe Williams and Noel Henderson. We were saddened by the death of several of our long term supporters: Dr Peter Freeman and Gwenda Alder who were members of The Deafness Foundation Trust and Stan Batson, a retired long term Board member.

During the year the Foundation has kept a close eye on the effects of the defunding of the two National Peak bodies, Deafness Forum and Deaf Australia, the proposal to sell Australian Hearing and the rollout of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS).

There have been many developments and changes during my time at the Foundation; the dissolving of The Deafness Foundation Trust and its folding into the Foundation, the establishing of individual fundraising licences with individual states of Australia, an increase in fundraising merchandise to include Butterfly keyrings and wristbands, the conducting of fundraising events including Art auctions through the efforts of A/Professor Gary Rance, a Trivia night and so much more. Our relocation from Global Television at Nunawading to our current premises at Bayswater in late 2009 was a major change with the need for us to pay commercial rent for the first time in a number of years.

One of the most amazing memories that I will take with me is that of Nicole Maher interpreting 'In the arms of an Angel' (Sarah

McLaughlin) at the recent funeral of Stan Batson. It was truly beautiful and showcased Auslan as a most beautiful language.

eafness Foundation allocated grants to the total of \$82,291 this year. The committee received twenty one applications for consideration, nine of which received

approval. In addition to these nine, the Foundation funded the second year of the ASPREE project, a third Peter Howson Deafness Fellowship, in conjunction with the Royal Victorian Eye and Ear Hospital, and two Education Encouragement Awards. The Foundation's grants are supporting research, organisational and community projects in Queensland, South Australia and Victoria. These projects will improve access by supporting the purchase of loan wireless communication devices, the development of Auslan resources and the provision of Auslan training. The Deaf Friendly Campaign and the Supermarket Counter Toppers will improve awareness of the needs of people who are deaf and hard of hearing. Research projects supported will contribute to our understanding in the areas of family centred care, hearing health in the elderly and outcomes for children with hearing loss. Please see the full list of grantees.

The Annual Grants presentation was held on Thursday 25th February 2016 at Baker & McKenzie. We were pleased to have two of our Governors, Professor Geoffrey Blainey and Mr Peter Ickeringill to present grants on the night. Our guest speakers were Dr Jessica Vitkovic and Dr Kerryn Saunders. Dr Vitkovic was the Peter Howson Deafness Fellow for 2014/15 and presented her current findings into the contribution of hearing to balance control. Her results suggest that the use of hearing aids in the elderly will not only provide an improvement in their everyday communication ability, but may also reduce the risk of falls. This research has the potential to improve the quality of life for older adults with hearing loss and lead to savings in the health budget. Dr Saunders was announced as the Peter Howson Deafness Fellow for 2016/17. She spoke about Cytomegalovirus (CMV) as a major cause of hearing loss in children and her plans for a multi-disciplinary clinic at Monash Children's Hospital to improve outcomes for these children.

Thanks go to all the volunteers and others who sell butterfly badges providing funds to enable the Grants program to continue. Thanks also to Baker & McKenzie for their valuable corporate support and their contribution to a very successful evening.

The recipient of the 2015 Secondary Education Encouragement Award was Victor Korng. At the time of receiving the award Victor was in Year 12 at Aquinas College in Ringwood which hosts a campus of his school, St Mary's College for Hearing Impaired Students. Victor is committed to improve himself and give back to the community. He

was extensively involved in social justice programs addressing poverty and was involved in the Victorian SES. Victor planned to attend university to study Criminal Justice Administration and he was successful in obtaining a place in the Bachelor of Law degree at the Melbourne campus of Australian Catholic University. He reports that the award has helped make the transition from school to university smoother by purchasing requirements such as a laptop and books for semester 1. He will put some funds towards paying his HECS fees. Victor sees the award as helping him to be prepared while building his confidence.

The recipient of the Post-Secondary Education Encouragement Award was Kristy Muxlow. Kristy is studying for her Bachelor of Behavioural Science (Psychology) at Swinburne University of Technology. As a mature age student her road to university was a long one. Kristy has used her award to purchase

a laptop which has made a big difference in when and how she studies as it allows her to work anywhere between work, study and caring for her family. The built in microphone and ability to plug in her headphones has made online tutorials much easier to hear and participate in. Kirsty has completed her first year subjects to a high standard and is half way through her second year subjects. She is committed to the community in which she lives, founding the local Mothers' Group and being a committee member of the local Playgroup. Kristy sees the award as being an amazing gift for which she is very appreciative.

Arious activities were held throughout the City of Melbourne during National Hearing
Awareness Week which was conducted from Sunday 23 to Saturday 29 August 2015. The Committee had the support and involvement of the following organisations: Better Hearing Australia (Vic), Hearservice (Vicdeaf), Australian Hearing and Deafness Foundation.

The Committee focussed its efforts on activities to be conducted at Federation Square on Monday 24 and Tuesday 25 August. We were joined by staff from The HEARing CRC and Taralye. Our aim was to interact with as many of the general public as possible to raise

awareness of deafness and hearing loss and the associated issues.

On Monday 24 August we were able to offer free hearing testing at Federation Square, conducted by Hearservice and Better Hearing staff and 50 of the general public requested screening. Interaction with the general public, local, out of town and tourists, was dynamic and very informative for all involved.

Max, the Hearservice mannequin, who can measure the sound levels of earbuds or headphones was again a popular attraction with users of individual music devices. From testing a device with Max, it is possible to check whether you are listening to music at a safe or dangerous level. It was disturbing to find a number of users were listening at unsafe levels. Information was provided on safe listening levels.

On Tuesday 25 August Australian Hearing held "The Big Australian Hearing Check" in Federation Square. There were acts on the stage, two extra marquees providing information and hearing checks and the Australian Hearing bus, where staff screened in excess of 100 people.

Deafness Foundation held a display on Thursday 27 August at Forest Hill Chase Shopping Centre and on Friday 28 August at Blackburn North Shopping Centre.

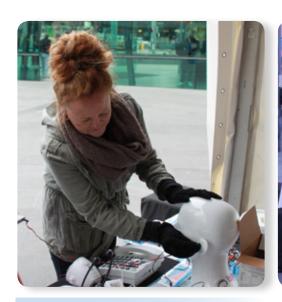
In reaching out to as many of the public as possible we advertised Hearing Awareness Week on MOTO Digital. This presented a digital informative display at 63 venues around the city. We received favourable input from the public who saw the display and were impressed.

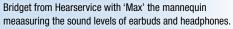

Noise Induced Hearing Loss Committee

he Noise Induced Hearing Loss (NIHL) Committee provides assistance in identifying key issues affecting noise induced hearing loss and linking stakeholders to information, legislative or otherwise, to ensure the public is not unnecessarily subjected to excessive noise. To this end, the Committee has been in regular contact with bodies such as WorkSafe Victoria and Standards Australia to examine possible initiatives which might contribute to hearing loss prevention.

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Future noise prevention initiatives

Hearing loss prevention and noise induced hearing loss, in particular, remain priorities for the Deafness Foundation. Changes to the operating arrangements as part of the DFV strategic re-direction means project work will proceed via individual dedicated projects rather than through standing committees like the NIHL committee.

This will be the final report of the NIHL Committee.

In 2015-2016, the NIHL Committee continued its investigation of strategies to prevent or mitigate noise induced hearing loss in:

- Victorian industry and
- Issues associated with music and entertainment venues, vehicle noise.

HEARsmart initiative and Music Venues

The HEARsmart™ initiative is a multifaceted campaign involving HEARing CRC and NAL which is aimed at increasing the awareness of and reducing exposure to, dangerous noise levels in both recreational and occupational environments. More broadly, the HEARing CRC intends to implement a variety of initiatives to influence and change the attitudes, behaviours, and policies to reduce the risks of acquiring a hearing loss. The HEARsmart music venue initiative received a supplementary grant from the Deafness Foundation in October 2014 to evaluate impacts of music on staff and audience at two selected music venues in Melbourne. The pilot program was managed by Dr Liz Beach from NAL (technical oversight) and Dr Jane Sewell from Hearing CRC (day to day operations) and supported by Siobhan McGinnity as part of her PhD studies. Preliminary results indicate music levels at both venues exceeded the Victorian workplace standard. On a positive note, patrons surveyed in the study indicated they would prefer the music at reduced or unchanged levels. The Pilot program is investigating strategies for working with the venues to mitigate the hazardous effects of loud music.

Noise Prevention in Victorian Industry

Noise induced hearing loss due to industrial noise exposure remains a significant source of preventable deafness in Victoria. An analysis of WorkCover claims indicated the number of noise induced hearing loss claims was increasing recently. The agriculture manufacturing and construction sectors had the largest proportion of noise induced hearing loss claims of all reported industry sectors possibly reflecting the predominance of this sector amongst Victoria's secondary industries.

WorkSafe has established a number of initiatives to address noise in the manufacturing sector.

Eric (Stan) Batson (1932 – 2016)

t was with great sadness that the Directors and staff of Deafness Foundation acknowledged the recent passing of their esteemed colleague and friend, Stan Batson, a most amazing man.

Stan's journey in life was a very remarkable one. Stan was born Deaf into a hearing family and attended the Victorian Deaf and Dumb Institution (as it was then known) at a time when signing was frowned upon. Stan was a great story teller and told many stories of his inability to communicate with his father, as his father did not sign, but they got by and following his schooling Stan went to work with his father, in his father's business. Trans Otway Ltd. He was an outgoing young man who travelled to England in the early 1950's where he met the love of his life, a young Deaf woman named Myra. Myra came to Australia and they were married in 1955. They had four hearing children and eventually settled in an outer suburb of Geelong.

Stan's personal history is fascinating, that of a young deaf man growing up in a hearing world but it is the professional profile that is so amazing. Stan would be the first to acknowledge that deaf children have so many more opportunities today than were available to him. He was a born leader with an enquiring mind and a genuine caring nature.

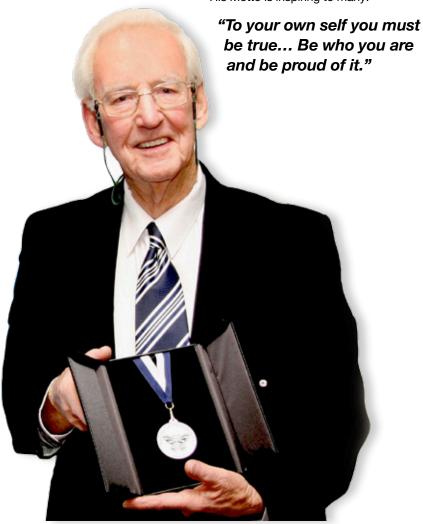
Throughout the 1990's along with caring for his own family, Stan and Myra visited isolated Deaf people and became true friends to many, always being aware of a person's ability to communicate not only in the Deaf world but in the hearing world. Stan completed a Graduate Diploma of Auslan and set about to act as an ambassador for Auslan in many schools. He was also a researcher and collator of historical material at La Trobe University.

Stan joined the Deafness Foundation Board in 1993 as the first signing Deaf Board Member and became the Auslan representative. He was appointed to the position of Vice-President in 1998 and held that position until his retirement in July 2013. Stan was a wonderful ambassador for the needs of the signing Deaf. He brought issues to the Board and kept the Board informed about new developments that affected the signing Deaf. He worked continuously to ensure that Deaf people could communicate with the hearing community and have access to Interpreters at all times. He was tireless in his pursuits for better training and conditions for Auslan interpreters. For his outstanding commitment to the Deafness Foundation he was awarded life time membership in 2009 and in 2014 for his outstanding contributions as an Ambassador for the Deaf, promoting understanding and inclusion, he was awarded the Deafness Foundation Medal.

Stan's legacy extends far beyond the Deafness Foundation. He was a respected leader in the Victorian Deaf Community. He was a champion at all times of the need for interaction and understanding between the Deaf and hearing communities. He was a tireless advocate for access and inclusion for Deaf and hard of hearing people and embraced new technology as an adjunct to better communication and inclusion for Deaf people. He sat on a number of National and State Boards and committees, including the Conexu Foundation, Australian Communication Exchange. Deafness Forum and the Geelong Deaf Social Club. He was also involved in the John Pierce Centre and the Victorian Deaf Catholic community.

We have lost one of our greatest champions and yet, at the same time, we are immensely grateful for and proud of his achievements. He leaves a remarkable legacy and will be greatly missed.

In 1994, Judy Chancellor, a volunteer and member of the President's Auxiliary, thought that a Butterfly Badge to be worn in a lapel or hat would be a wonderful way of raising awareness in the community about deafness and hearing impairment. It was then adopted as a way to fundraise.

For over 20 years the sale of butterfly badges has been a major fundraising activity for the Deafness Foundation.

Originally designed by Judy, the badge designs and colours change every year and their popularity continues to grow. They have become a "collector's item" for many.

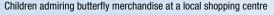

Notes to the Financial Satements

For the Year Ended 31 March 2016

Note 1 - Accounting policies

1a Basis of Preparation

Deafness Foundation (Victoria) is a Company limited by quarantee incorporated and domiciled in Australia.

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the Australian Charities and Not for profits Commission Act 2012. The company is a not for profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless otherwise stated.

The financial statements, except for the cash flow information, have been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities. The amounts presented in the financial statements have been rounded to the nearest dollar.

1b Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

1c Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1d Financial Instruments **Initial Recognition and Measurement**

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the entities becomes a party to the contractual provisions to the instrument. For financial assets, this is equivalent to the date that the company commits itself to either purchase or sell the asset (ie trade date accounting is adopted). Financial instruments are initially measured at fair value plus transaction costs except where the instrument is classified 'at fair value through profit or loss' in which case transaction costs are expensed to profit or loss immediately. Financial instruments are classified and measured as set out below.

Financial assets at fair value through profit and loss

Financial assets are classified at 'fair value through profit and loss' when they are held for trading for the purpose of short term profit taking, or where they are derivatives not held for hedging purposes, or when they are designated as such to avoid an accounting mismatch or to enable performance evaluation where a group of financial assets is managed by key management personnel on a fair value basis in accordance with a documented risk management or investment strategy. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value with changes in carrying value being included in profit or loss.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Held-to-maturity investments

Held-to-maturity investments are non-derivative

financial assets that have fixed maturities and fixed or determinable payments, and it is the company's intention to hold these investments to maturity. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Impairment

At each reporting date, the company assess whether there is objective evidence that a financial instrument has been impaired. Impairment losses are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

1e Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or deemed cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment is measured on the cost basis less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by the directors to ensure it is not in excess of the depreciated replacement cost.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets is depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives to company commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets based on useful lives are:

Office Equipment 10% Computer Equipment 33.3%

1f Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

1g Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

1h Income taxes

No current or deferred income tax assets or liabilities have been raised by the Company as it is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act. The company is registered as a charity with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission.

1i Leases

Lease payments for operating leases, where substantially all of the risks and benefits remain with the lessor, are charged as expenses on a straight-line basis over the life of the lease term.

1j Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Sales income consists of sale of butterfly badges, butterfly keyrings and wristbands. These sales are made for fundraising purposes and are recognised as income when cash is received.

Donation income is recognised when it is received.

Government grants are recognised as income as they are earned. Where grants relate to activities not yet undertaken, and there is an obligation to repay those funds if they are not spent for the approved purpose then such funds are recognised as an "income received in advance" liability until such time as the funded activities are undertaken.

The organisation has implemented controls over the receipting, banking and recording of fundraising and donation revenue. There remains an inherent risk associated with cash revenue received by the organisation. The Board believe that they have implemented sufficient controls to ensure that no material value of fundraising and donation revenue is missed from the financial statements.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

1k Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the company reviews the carrying values of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the statement of comprehensive income.

11 Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the statement of cash flow on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

1m Critical accounting estimates and judgments

The directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the Foundation.

Key estimates - Impairment

The Foundation assesses impairment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the entity that may lead to impairment of assets. Where an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. Fair value less costs to sell or current replacement cost calculations performed in assessing recoverable amounts incorporate a number of key estimates.
